Foreword from Hedge End Police Sergeant Stuart Jackson, Acting Sergeant Graham McGee and Acting Sergeant Ian Simpson

Welcome to the October edition of the Policing Eastleigh partnership newsletter.



Last month you heard from the Sector Inspector, Philip Raymond. Now we wanted to introduce you, our local partners, to the Sergeants responsible for managing policing activities on the ground in Hedge End.

In total we have 47 years' of experience between us, covering a broad range of disciplines within local policing. This includes roles within custody, being part of Response and Patrol teams, as well as Neighbourhood Policing Teams, to being involved in Integrated Offender Management.

Sergeant Stuart Jackson and Acting Sergeant Graham McGee are responsible for covering Hedge End North (encompassing Botley, Hedge End and West End).

The current priorities for Hedge End North include drug use and anti-social behaviour in parks and play areas, motorcycle nuisance throughout the area and speeding on the road networks in Botley, West End and Hedge End Village.

Stuart has 20 years' service having been on the frontline throughout his tenure covering roles in Response and Patrol, Custody and Neighbourhood Policing. He started his service in Eastleigh and Hedge End before promotions took him across the county to Winchester, Andover, Southampton Central and then finally back to Eastleigh.

While Graham has over 16 years' experience within Hampshire Constabulary, covering Southampton, New Forest and Winchester as part of their Response and Patrol teams. He took up a role in the Integrated Offender Management team helping to manage some of the most prolific offenders in Southampton and the New Forest, working closely with probation and drugs workers.

As with Sergeant Jackson, Graham then returned to the district of Eastleigh, covering Hedge End North in his current role.

In Hedge End South, covering Hamble, Netley and Bursledon, Acting Sergeant Ian Simpson and his team are prioritising anti-social behaviour in the local area, damage to play areas and communal spaces, as well as burglary prevention advice to communities as the nights begin to draw in.

lan joined the Constabulary over a decade ago and like his colleagues has spent the majority of his policing career as part of a Response and Patrol team – covering the likes of Shirley, Southampton Central and Romsey before moving to Hedge End.

12 months ago Ian took up a role in the Neighbourhood Policing team and is passionate about raising awareness of autism among colleagues, promoting the difficulties faced by those in the local community it affects and educating them on how best to communicate with those on the spectrum.

Investigation update



Four teenagers charged following assault on paramedics in Eastleigh

Officers investigating reports of <u>emergency service staff being assaulted in Eastleigh</u> charged four teenagers in connection with the attack.

The charges came after two paramedics were assaulted and their vehicle damaged in the early hours of Tuesday 16 June on Romsey Road.

A 16-year-old boy from Eastleigh was charged with committing two public order offence by causing fear of violence.

A 17-year-old boy from Eastleigh was charged with assaulting an emergency services worker, causing criminal damage and resisting arrest.

Arron Singh Punia, aged 18, of Great Farm Road, Eastleigh was charged with one count of assaulting an emergency services worker, causing criminal damage, resisting arrest and a public order offence by causing fear of violence.

They will appear before West Hampshire Youth Court on 26 October 2020.

Man charged with theft of van in Eastleigh

Police officers investigating the theft of a motor vehicle in Eastleigh have charged a man.

A hire van was stolen from a car park on Sopwith Road in the early hours of Friday 2 October.

Benjamin Pratt, 31, of Faversham Road, Beckenham in Greater London has been charged with theft of a motor vehicle.

He was released on unconditional bail and will appear before Southampton Magistrates Court on 5 November 2020.

COURT RESULT

Man jailed for 16 months following shoplifting offences in Hedge End

A man who stole a can of beer and assaulted a retail assistant in Hedge End has been jailed for 16 months.

Jan Hansen, aged 38, attempted to steal four cans of beer from the Co-Operative store on Lower Northam Road in Hedge End, at around 7.20pm on Thursday 3 September.

An altercation ensued as staff attempted to stop Hansen leaving the store, whereby an employee was struck in the face with a can of beer. This resulted in a female retail assistant receiving minor injuries including pain and a bloodied nose.

Hansen was sentenced at Southampton Crown Court on Tuesday 13 October to 16 months in jail after pleading guilty to robbery.

Community cohesion

Speeding. Dangerous driving. These are common issue that seems to blight every community and sadly, Eastleigh is no different.

You asked. We listened.

The rise in use of social media has also highlighted to us as a district the many concerns that the local community has when it comes to speeding and dangerous driving.

Our officers will often be seen in speeding hot-spot areas conducting speed checks and looking out for any incidents of dangerous driving.

Patrols plans to combat these types of issues are heavily influenced by community intelligence, so local residents telling us about such incidents makes a real difference.

Hants SNAP scheme

Recently, the Constabulary launched their Hants SNAP scheme, a police initiative aimed at dealing with traffic offences caught on camera, in order to protect road users across the region.

Under the scheme, footage of dangerous incidents can be submitted <u>via an online portal</u>. This can be from a dash cam, head cam or other recording device that has been legally used.

Once we have received this, along with written witness statements, this will be reviewed by trained decision makers to assess whether any offences have been committed.

They will consider whether action is proportionate and if there is sufficient evidence to prosecute any person involved. For those we do prosecute, outcomes could include an educational course, fixed penalty notice, court prosecution or a warning letter.
